United States Flag: Stars and Stripes

Instructional Procedures:
Students will be seated around teacher prepared for a discussion.
Give each student an American flag or a picture of an American flag. http://www.ushistory.org/betsy/more/flags/usflag.pdf
Teachers will ask guided questions to help students think about flags. These might include:
What do you have in your hand?
What does it represent?
What do you see on the flag?
How many stripes are there? Why?
How many stars? Why?
What are the colors of our flag? Why do you think these colors were selected?
Where do you see flags flown?
Is there a time when you think of the flag even when you cannot see it?
Are there any songs that you can think of that make you think of the flag?
We are going to listen to a song called <i>Stars and Stripes Forever</i> that was recorded on a Thomas Edison recorder in 1913. Listen and tell me if you have ever heard the song before and what the song is saying. Can you think of any other songs that are about our flag? (<i>Grand Old Flag, The Star Spangled Banner</i>)
Assignment:
Now that we have learned about the American flag which symbol means the most to you, the stars or the stripes? Kindergarten - Draw the symbol.
First grade- Draw the symbol and explain why. Second grade - Draw the symbol and explain why.

Extension
Are there flags that do not represent a country? What are they? (examples: School Flags, Team Flags, Organization Flags) Create your own personal flag.

Math: Counting stars and stripes and looking for patterns in flags. How many flags are in the school building?
